Parent Questionnaire

We have sent you a link to our end of year, online Parent Questionnaire. We would be very grateful if you could spend 10 minutes completing and returning it.

Phonics Books

We are appealing to our Reception and Key Stage One pupils to return any missing books to us that have not yet been returned. The Little Wandle Phonic reading books are very expensive to replace so unfortunately, we will need to make a charge of £5.00 per book for any that are not returned.

Pencil Cases in September

To support us with managing our budget for equipment, we will be asking each child to bring to school a basic pencil case and set of equipment. We want to stress that pencil cases must be named, small, **clear plastic** and only have the following items in: 2 school pencils (HB-not fancy), a small ruler for underlining, a small rubber, a glue stick, a red pen for responding to marking and some colouring pencils (not felt tips). All other equipment will be supplied.



The pencil case must fit in your child's tray. Please do not purchase expensive pencil cases (eg: Smiggle) as these will be sent home if they are too big.

Earrings

If you are planning to get your child's ears pierced please arrange to do this at the beginning of the 6 -week holiday so that they have time to heal. Please remember that children are not allowed to wear earrings or jewellery to school.

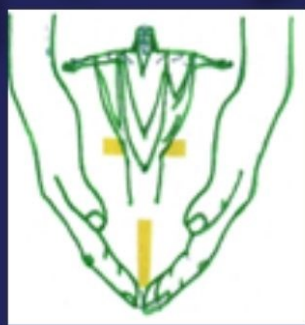

Based on the gospel for Sunday 16 July, Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time; Matthew 13:1-23

"Listen, anyone who has ears!"

In listening to the parable of the Sower, I can identify with each of the different types of soil. At times, I am "on the edge of the path". I sit in Mass and, come the end of the readings, I remember nothing. Other times I listen, something strikes me, and I enthusiastically respond, but it doesn't last. Sometimes, I really do intend to see it through, but life is so busy. And then occasionally, I really do take the Gospel message to heart, I make changes and I can see it bear fruit, often in unexpected ways.

What I need to do though is to nurture and improve the soil into which the "word of the kingdom" is falling. I must break up the hardened parts on the edge of the path and remove the rocks and the thorns through time spent with the Scriptures, in prayer and spiritual reading. Cultivated in this way, I hope to be more productive in building the kingdom in this world.

One way in which as a parish we have been trying to respond to the Sower is by becoming involved with Live Simply: making changes so that we live more simply and sustainably with creation and in solidarity with people in poverty. As part of this we have added our signatures to a letter to the World Bank asking them to protect the rights of small farmers to use their own seeds rather than being forced to use expensive hybrid seeds produced by large companies.

Preparing for the Mass of Sunday 16th July 2023 - The Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

1 Relax & Remember

Set aside 10 -15 minutes and create a suitable environment by removing any distractions. Make sure that you are comfortable. Perhaps light a candle. Make the sign of the cross † and remain still for a minute of settling silence. **Call to mind the love that God has for you. Remember that through this scripture our Lord is truly present.** Then read the Gospel, preferably aloud and slowly, and pay attention to any words that stand out. If any do, meditate on them for a few minutes and be invited into a dialogue with God.



2 Read

Taken from the Gospel for Sunday 16th July 2023 - The Parable of the Sower (Matthew 13:1-9)

Jesus left the house and sat by the lakeside, but such crowds gathered round him that he got into a boat and sat there. The people all stood on the beach, and he told them many things in parables. He said, 'Imagine a sower going out to sow. As he sowed, some seeds fell on the edge of the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Others fell on patches of rock where they found little soil and sprang up straight away, because there was no depth of earth; but as soon as the sun came up they were scorched and, not having any roots, they withered away. Others fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Others fell on rich soil and produced their crop, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Listen, anyone who has ears!'



3 Reflect

After spending a few minutes considering this Gospel, continue by reading Fr Henry Wansbrough's reflection.

Like any good teacher, Jesus uses pictures – or parables. Ever heard the one about the elephant and the wasp? Or electricity like a toy train going round a room? Anyway, for the next three weeks we have some of these pictures, to show us what Jesus is trying to do. This first one is rather sad. Whatever the sower does seems to fail: seed pecked up by birds, scorched by the sun, choked by thistles. What are my pecking birds, my scorching sun, my choking thistles which annihilate the seed Jesus sows in me? It's probably different for every one of us. But some, just a little, of the seed bears a fantastic harvest. There must be something I can show to the Lord with pride and gratitude: 'Look, this is the seed you gave me; it has grown, developed, and here is your harvest.' Jesus, too, reflected on his mission to establish his Father's sovereignty on earth. Jesus, too, may well have wondered if he was getting anywhere. It was only when he had failed utterly, alone, deserted and tortured, that his perseverance won the crown. Jesus doesn't want the successful. He wants the failures as his followers – and that is where the harvest lies.

In Jesus' story what is the seed? What prevents the seed reaching its full growth in me? In what way has the seed made me a better person?

Conclude by asking God to bless you with one of the following spiritual gifts to help you act on any resolution you have made: love, understanding, wisdom, faithfulness, peace, self control, patience, or joy. Please remember to pray for the Church and particularly our school families. **Then conclude by requesting the prayers of Our Lady & St Joseph.**

WEDNESDAY WORD PLUS +

Fr Henry's reflections on the first and second readings of Sunday 16th July 2023



First Reading: *The Effective Word of God*

Isaiah 55:10-11

Thus says the Lord: 'As the rain and the snow come down from the heavens and do not return without watering the earth, making it yield and giving growth to provide seed for the sower and bread for the eating, so the word that goes from my mouth does not return to me empty, without carrying out my will and succeeding in what it was sent to do.'

This poetic passage from Isaiah about the word of God may be understood on two levels. On one level it prepares for Jesus' parable in the Gospel reading about the sower and the seed. But while Isaiah stresses the effectiveness of the word of God, Jesus reflects on the failure of his word with many sections of his hearers, as well as on the brilliant success of his word in those who bear fruit 'thirtyfold, sixtyfold, a hundredfold'. On another level this passage prepares us for the meditation on the Word of God in the prologue to the Gospel of John: 'In the beginning was the Word; the Word was with God and the Word was God.' This helps to explain just how God, the awesome and inexpressible, can be manifested and active in creation. In Genesis God created by his Word ('Let there be light!' 'Let there be a vault! etc.), so the Word is seen not as something separate from and independent of God, but as the concrete expression of God's will, the manifestation of divine power. The Word which comes forth from God's mouth and does not return unfulfilled is, on this level, the creative power of God, unstoppably fulfilling the will of God in the world.

How is God's Word at work in creation?

Second Reading: *Creation Freed from Corruption*

Romans 8:18-23

I think that what we suffer in this life can never be compared to the glory, as yet unrevealed, which is waiting for us. The whole creation is eagerly waiting for God to reveal his sons. It was not for any fault on the part of creation that it was made unable to attain its purpose, it was made so by God; but creation still retains the hope of being freed, like us, from its slavery to decadence, to enjoy the same freedom and glory as the children of God. From the beginning till now the entire creation, as we know, has been groaning in one great act of giving birth; and not only creation, but all of us who possess the first-fruits of the Spirit, we too groan inwardly as we wait for our bodies to be set free.

In our reading of Romans 8 on life in the Spirit of the Risen Christ we have missed out a few crucial verses (they are used on a separate occasion) on our adoption as sons, enabling us – both men and women – to call God 'Abba', 'Father'. This intimate Aramaic family name, used by Jesus to his Father in his agonized prayer in the Garden (Mark 14:36), can be used by all his followers who share his life. With Jesus we are heirs of God, sharing his inheritance. Not only ourselves, however, but the whole of creation is renewed and re-created by the Spirit. It all takes on a new dimension and a new life, groaning in the Spirit to be released from frustration. This is a new reason for human beings (now renewed in Christ) to care for God's creation. In the first place we were created in the image of God to further and to complete his creation. Now, re-created as adopted sons and heirs of God, our responsibility is increased and intensified. As yet, we have only the first-fruits of the Spirit, but first-fruits make sense and have their value only in view of the fullness and completion of the harvest.

What is our responsibility as heirs of God?

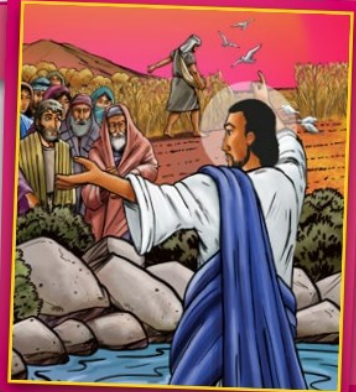


1 Our Special Time Together

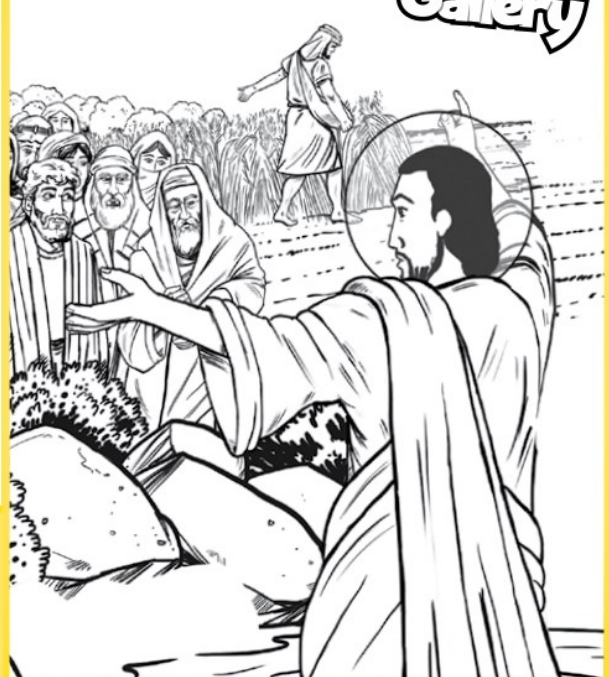
