#### School Council

Our new School Council have been working hard on projects since September, when the School Council and Friends of Holy Cross raised £465 at our MacMillan charity coffee morning.

In October the children co-ordinated a Wear it Yellow non- uniform day for a donation, KS2 had an assembly and the Council supported activities on the playground to promote good mental health

Also, in October we had our Harvest Collection, Some of our school Council had the opportunity to deliver our food items we collected to Streets 2 Home and the children were given a tour of the facility. Currently Streets to Homes have 11 homeless people in Harlow they are helping. Streets 2 Home is at Wych Elm in the town centre. They are always grateful of any donations of food items, clothing, coats, tents, sleeping bags etc. You can take these directly to Streets 2 Home. They are open Monday to Friday 10am-2pm

This month we are collecting shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child from Monday 7th - 21st November. Children can bring in their filled boxes and place them in the school hall on the table. This year shoe boxes are going to be sent to Ukraine and neighbouring countries where there are refugees,



#### Eco Council

Our new school Eco Council have been working on projects and ideas. This year the children would like to raise money for a new school greenhouse.

The children have been looking at how waste and plastic is used in school, monitoring their classrooms to ensure electrical equipment is turned off when not in use, checking children are using the right bins in class (Waste, recycling and food bin) also making sure taps are not dripping and monitoring rubbish and waste on the playground.

In October the Eco Council worked with Friends of Holy Cross to distribute bags and leaflets to all the classes from Bags 2 Schools to encourage parents and families to have a sort out at home and send in clothing items etc. Bags 2 School then collects all the bags and converts the weight of the items in to cash for our school. We are currently waiting to find out how much money this Eco project has generated for school.

November and December- this year the Eco Council are running a school calendar competition. All classes will be given an Eco theme and asked to create a picture in the style of the suggested artist. All the information for this will be sent out via class teachers on Tapestry and Seesaw.

#### Firework and Bonfire Safety

On Tuesday morning we welcomed Kirsty from the Essex County Fire and Rescue Service. She led an assembly for children in both Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 on how to stay safe this weekend during Bonfire Night. Kirsty advised that it is better to attend an organised event, however if you are planning a home event, fireworks should be bought from a reputable source and the advice below, followed. Please discuss firework safety and the importance of behaving sensibly around



bonfires with your children by reminding your children of the messages shared by Kirsty below, which also applies to us, as adults.

The Fireworks Code	Bonfire Safety
<ul> <li>Only buy fireworks marked UKCA (Or CE until 21<sup>st</sup> December 2022)</li> <li>Keep fireworks in a closed non-flammable box</li> <li>Follow the instructions on each firework</li> <li>Light them at arm's length, using a taper</li> <li>Stand well back</li> <li>Never go near a firework that has been lit. Even if it hasn't gone off, it could still explode</li> <li>Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them</li> <li>Children should always be supervised around fireworks</li> <li>Light sparklers one at a time and always wear gloves</li> <li>Never give sparklers to a child under five</li> <li>Keep pets indoors</li> <li>Don't set off noisy fireworks late at night and never after 11pm</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Site the bonfire well away from houses, garages, sheds, fences, overhead cables, trees and shrubs</li> <li>Never leave the bonfire burning unattended</li> <li>Build the stack so that it is stable and will not collapse outwards or to one side</li> <li>NEVER use flammable liquids - paraffin or petrol - to light the fire</li> <li>Don't burn foam-filled furniture, aerosols, tins of paint and bottles</li> <li>Keep everyone away from the fire - especially children, who must be supervised at all times</li> <li>Pour water on the embers before leaving</li> </ul>

## BONFIRE NIGHT SAFETY TIPS

WHEN MAKING A BONFIRE, MAKE SURE YOU BUILD IT WELL AWAY FROM HOUSES, GARAGES, SHEDS, FENCES, OVERHEAD CABLES, TREES AND SHRUBS AND ALWAYS AWAY FROM FIREWORKS.

WHEN YOU BUILD A BONFIRE ENSURE IT IS STABLE AND REMEMBER NEVER TO LIGHT IT WITH A FLAMMABLE LIQUID.

KEEP EVERYONE WELL BACK FROM OPEN FIRES AND ENSURE CHILDREN ARE SUPERVISED AT ALL TIMES.

WHEN BUILDING A BONFIRE, ALWAYS ENSURE YOU HAVE A BUCKET OF WATER OR FIRE EXTINGUISHER HANDY IN CASE OF EMERGENCIES.



AT THE END OF YOUR BONFIRE PARTY, POUR WATER ON THE EMBERS BEFORE LEAVING.

ALWAYS KEEP YOUR FIREWORKS IN A CLOSED METAL BOX AND TAKE THEM OUT ONE AT A TIME. REMEMBER CHILDREN SHOULD NOT HAVE ACCESS TO OR BE NEAR FIREWORKS.

WHEN USING FIREWORKS, ALWAYS FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS. AND IF IT IS DARK ALWAYS READ THEM BY TORCHLIGHT AND NEVER BY A NAKED FLAME. ENSURE YOU ONLY BUY FIREWORKS FROM REPUTABLE RETAILERS.

ALWAYS LIGHT FIREWORKS AT ARM'S LENGTH WITH A TAPER. YOU MUST NEVER RETURN TO A LIT FIREWORK AND NEVER THROW A SPENT FIREWORK ON A BONFIRE.

ALWAYS HOLD SPARKLERS AT ARM'S LENGTH AND WEAR GLOVES WHEN HANDLING THEM. ONCE THE SPARKLERS ARE OUT MAKE SURE YOU PUT THEM IN A BUCKET OF WATER.

NEVER GIVE SPARKLERS TO CHILDREN UNDER 5 YEARS OLD AND REMEMBER, NEVER RUN WITH SPARKLERS.

With each new release of FIFA comes a host of new players to unlock – meaning that youngsters can feel pressured to keep buying to compete with their friends

## **Advice for Parents & Carers**

#### BE SELECTIVE WITH CHATS

It's enormous fun for FIFA players to chat online with friends, even as their teams do battle in the game. It's probably the safest idea, though, to restrict contact with strangers. By turning off voice chat in FIFA and allowing cross-party chat in their device's settings, your child can speak to people who are already on their friends list but won't be able to talk to (or hear) strangers online.

#### CONTROL SPENDING

If your child plays Ultimate Team mode on FIFA, ensure their account isn't linked to your payment methods – so they'll need your permission to make in-game purchases. Alternatively, you could use parental controls to limit spending – or set up a pre-paid 'allowance'. When excitedly clicking options on screen, it's easy for a young person to forget the real-world repercussions of online purchases.

#### STAY ALERT FOR SCAMS

There are some key things to remember about potential FIFA scams. Firstly, EA *never* contacts users via any method other than emails to the account holder (which may well be you). Neither will they ever ask for a player's username or password outside the game itself. EA's terms and conditions outlaw the buying of FUT coins, so anyone selling them should be treated as suspicious.

#### AVOID 'EXTRA TIME'

If your child's spending a lot of time on FIFA 23 and seems less enthusiastic about other activities in their life, you could consider restricting how long they can play for each day with the parental controls in their device's settings. Even if they're not playing on their console or computer, there's a FIFA companion app for smartphones – but that can be limited through parental controls, too.



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Based on the gospel for Sunday 6 November, Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time: Luke 20:27-38

#### "God is God, not of the dead, but of the living."

In this reading the Sadducees ask Jesus a question about what life will be like in heaven. What is going on here? A little background may help.

The Sadducees were the priestly class, based in the Temple, coming from David's kingly line. Think of them as the political elite with all the required security - wealth, education, and Roman backing - to maintain their status. Believing only in the here and now, and in their own preservation, they were fundamentally short-sighted and had little to offer.

Jesus, in this Gospel, calls us to be long-sighted and to forget the questions and worries that are so outside this long view as to be totally irrelevant. What matters is that God is alive and active. Abraham, Isaac and Jacob continue to live in God who is ever faithful even when the immediate future might appear to look very bleak. God accompanies us into that bleakness.

How am I to be a child of the resurrection for those facing uncertain futures?

How am I to be an angel of light for those grappling with the darkness of war and conflict, with oppression, the cost-of-living crisis, fuel poverty, illness, and bereavement?

Do I truly feel alive to God, and can I show, by my words and actions, that the God of the living is alive to me and, through me, to others?

Lord, open my mind to the long view of your Kingdom; open my eyes to needs demanding a present response; open my heart to the promise of your life. Amen.

#### Preparing for the Mass of Sunday 6th November 2022 - The Thirty Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

### Relax & Remember

Set aside 10 -15 minutes and create a suitable environment by removing any distractions. Make sure that you are comfortable. Perhaps light a candle. Make the sign of the cross **†** and remain still for a minute of settling silence. **Call to mind the love that God has for you. Remember that through this scripture our Lord is truly present.** Then read the Gospel, preferably aloud and slowly, and pay attention to any words that stand out. If any do, meditate on them for a few minutes and be invited into a dialogue with God.



## Read

#### Taken from the Gospel for 6th November 2022 (Luke 20:27-38): The Sadducees' Riddle

Some Sadducees - those who say that there is no resurrection - approached Jesus and they put this question to him, "Master, we have it from Moses in writing, that if a man's married brother dies childless, the man must marry the widow to raise up children for his brother. Well, then, there were seven brothers. The first, having married a wife, died childless. The second and then the third married the widow. And the same with all seven, they died leaving no children. Finally the woman herself died. Now, at the resurrection, to which of them will she be wife since she had been married to all seven?" Jesus replied, "The children of this world take wives and husbands, but those who are judged worthy of a place in the other world and in the resurrection from the dead do not marry because they can no longer die, for they are the same as the angels, and being children of the resurrection they are sons of God. And Moses himself implies that the dead rise again, in the passage about the bush where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is God, not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all men are in fact alive."

## 3 Reflect

## (\*)

#### After spending a few minutes considering this Gospel, continue by reading Fr Henry Wansbrough's reflection.

Since they did not believe in the resurrection or any sort of life after death, the Sadducees are trying to make fun of Jesus. By the Levirate Law of Judaism, if I marry and die without begetting a son, my nearest male relative is bound to marry my widow and raise up a son in my name to carry on my line. The Sadducees' neat mockery is to ask what happens if this is repeated seven times (and worse than that, for the perfect number 'seven' means 'ad infinitum'). Jesus, again with typical neatness, turns their argument back upon them by returning to that key text of scripture when God replies to Moses at the Burning Bush. Not only is this reply in the present tense, 'I am (still) the God of patriarchs long dead', but it is the fundamental text which guarantees God's rescue and protection of, and his presence with, his people through thick and thin. This is one more instance of Jesus' deep knowledge and mastery of scripture, of the way that he can transcend the flippant and superficial arguments of his opponents and make plain the deep and true sense of these holy texts. To God no one is 'dead and gone'; we all remain safe in his hands. **What does it mean to you to be a 'child' of the resurrection?**

### Respond & Request

Now slowly and prayerfully read the Gospel once again but this time in silence. Consider how this Gospel could apply to your life in general. Then thank God for any insight you may have received. Fr Henry's reflections on the first and second readings of Sunday 6th November 2022

#### First Reading: Rising to New Life

#### 2 Maccabees 7:1-2. 9-14

There were seven brothers who were arrested with their mother. The king tried to force them to taste pig's flesh, which the Law forbids, by torturing them with whips and scourges. One of them, acting as spokesman for the others, said, "What are you trying to find out from us? We are prepared to die rather than break the Law of our ancestors." With his last breath the second brother exclaimed, "Inhuman fiend, you may discharge us from this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up, since it is for his laws that we die, to live again for ever." After him, they amused themselves with the third, who on being asked for his tongue promptly thrust it out and boldly held out his hands, with these honourable words, "It was heaven that gave me these limbs; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again." The king and his attendants were astounded at the young man's courage and his utter indifference to suffering. When this one was dead they subjected the fourth to the same savage torture. When he neared his end he cried, "Ours is the better choice, to meet death at men's hands, yet relying on God's promise that we shall be raised up by him; whereas for you there can be no resurrection, no new life."

This is the only reading from the Books of Maccabees in the Sunday cycle of readings. In the year 167 BC the Syrian Empire dominated Palestine, and King Antiochus IV decided to make an important step towards unifying his empire by wiping out the singular worship and religious customs of the Jews. He met stronger resistance than expected, and a great persecution was necessary. The resistance was led by three brothers who were given the name 'Maccabee' or 'Hammer'; they give their name to these two biblical books (and also to an excellent beer in Israel). Our reading narrates one incident from that persecution. The lasting importance of such a heroic stance by the brothers was the development of the doctrine of resurrection to new life. Until that time a popular opinion among the Israelites was that the dead were confined to Sheol, to a wretched half-life, where the dead had no strength and could not even praise God. This reading shows us that they had now begun to recognise that God would raise up to new life those who had died for their faith in persecution. By the time of Jesus this belief in the resurrection of the dead to new life was standard in Israel. Only the traditionalist Sadducees did not accept it.

How different would your life be if Jesus had not risen and extended to us the hope of resurrection?

#### Second Reading: The Lord is Faithful

#### 2 Thessalonians 2:16 - 3:5

May our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God our Father who has given us his love and, through his grace, such inexhaustible comfort and such sure hope, comfort you and strengthen you in everything good that you do or say. Finally, brothers, pray for us; pray that the Lord's message may spread quickly, and be received with honour as it was among you; and pray that we may be preserved from the interference of bigoted and evil people, for faith is not given to everyone. But the Lord is faithful, and he will give you strength and guard you from the evil one, and we, in the Lord, have every confidence that you are doing and will go on doing all that we tell you. May the Lord turn your hearts towards the love of God and the fortitude of Christ.

The Christian cannot opt out of the world.

A reading from Thessalonians heralds the end of the liturgical year (Year A ends with readings from 1 Thessalonians and Year C with this second letter). Both letters are concerned with the Second Coming of Christ at the end of time. The little community at Thessalonika was worried. Paul had taught them that Christ had conquered death: for those baptised into Christ, death was no more. But then Christians had died! So Paul wrote to them that Christ would soon come in a triumphal procession, bringing with him his followers who had already died. This must have thrown the Thessalonians into a frenzy of excitement at such an imminent Coming of the Lord, for Paul writes to them this second letter to calm them down, explaining that the Coming is not so utterly imminent. They must continue to live life in the world, for there must first be a period in which evil is still at work, a period in which the Word of the Lord is still spreading, as it is among them, and in which they need protection from evil (or the Evil One). The Christian cannot opt out of the world, and so needs the strength of the Lord to live the ways of the Lord in a world which fundamentally fails to recognise such ways.

Reflecting on St Paul's teaching to the Thessalonians, what is our calling as Christians in today's world?
