



GOSPEL: VALUE: Our Gospel Value this coming week is GENTLENESS. Please reflect on this at home with your child.

Late Collection


A letter went home last Friday explaining that we would be charging a late pick up fee if children are collected late after school or from After School Club. This will come into effect on Monday and will be £1 per minute. We urge you to book your child into After School Club if you believe that you will not be on time to collect them at the end of the day. It is not possible or reasonable for parents to expect staff to supervise their child if they are not collected on time, as teachers and office staff are on to other tasks at the end of the school day.

Parking

A letter was sent out yesterday regarding parking in the Passmores Academy car park. We have received a letter from the Executive Principle of Passmores expressing his concern over our parents parking without permission and then the behaviour of some parents when they were challenged. Some parents have been abusive and threatening and this does not put our school in a good light nor is it acceptable behaviour in front of children. ATTENDANCE MATTERS

Congratulations to the joint winners of the KS1 Attendance Award, Hedgehogs achieving 99% attendance. Well done! The winners of the KS2 Attendance Award, are Rabbits, attaining 99% attendance. Well done!

Please ensure you are sending your child into school everyday, unless they are not well enough to attend. Attending school is so important and makes a huge difference to your child's learning. The gates open at 8:30am until 8.50am.

It is essential you notify us of your child's absence by 9am either by telephone or using the Pupil Asset report absence option on every day of absence. We need full details of why your child is unable to attend school. We are frequently having to contact parents, to find out why their child is absent from school. If you do not notify us of the reason for your child's absence it may not be authorised.

Absences over 3 days require supporting medical evidence, for the additional absence to be authorised. Medical evidence can take the form of prescriptions, antibiotics and medical appointments.

Parents of children below attendance targets will be invited in for a meeting with the Educational Welfare Officer.

Based on the gospel for Sunday 21 January, Third Sunday in Ordinary Time: Mark 1:14-20

"Follow me and I will make you fishers of men."

In today's Gospel, Jesus invites us to come and follow him. He asks us to leave behind all of our material possessions and earthly desires to love and serve him.

Reading this passage, I thought about how many times my parents have called for me while I sat scrolling on my phone. I thought about how many times I've ignored their calls or asked to delay their requests. How often do I ignore or delay when it comes to answering God's call?

Jesus asks us to surrender everything we have to grow in friendship with him. This message uniquely resonates with today's materialistic culture. Too often we forget that this world is temporary and that we are called to eternal life in Heaven. We've grown attached to the distractions of this world and forgotten the blessings that await us.

Imitating the disciples, let us joyfully respond to God's call and grow in communion with him. As we follow him, we are asked to love our neighbour, to treat others as we would wish to be treated and to stand up for justice in our world. One way we can do this is by supporting CAFOD's work, helping those in most need around the world.

Lord God, help me to desire you. Help me to hear your voice and choose to follow you. I ask for the courage to live for you and not for this world. Amen.

Encountering Christ

Prayerfully preparing for Sunday Mass with special prayers for our school families

Set aside 10-15 minutes and create a suitable environment by removing any distractions. Make sure that you are comfortable. Perhaps light a candle. Make the sign of the cross and remain still for a minute of settling silence. Call to mind the love that God has for you. Remember that through this scripture our Lord is truly present. Then read the Gospel, preferably aloud and slowly, and pay attention to any words that stand out. If any do, meditate on them for a few minutes and be invited into a dialogue with God.


Reflect

After spending a few minutes considering the Gospel, continue by reading this reflection

What is going on? We had last Sunday the story of the first two disciples joining Jesus. One of them was Andrew, the other unnamed. Now we get another story, in another place, of other first disciples being called. So the Church underlines, two weeks running, the importance of Jesus' new community. The first thing he does is call disciples. He can't do everything on his own, and that is the point of the Church. He calls disciples to make a new people, a new Israel - old, young, middle-aged: we all have our part to fill in Jesus' play. Tired old people, busy parents, lively youngsters - each of us can make a unique contribution, especially since Jesus has chosen us himself. An odd choice, some of us! What did he want ME to do in the new family of Jesus? The two different versions of the calling of the disciples show that at least two different people told this story. When two people tell the same story, there are bound to be variations. The place didn't matter, or the order in which the disciples were called. The point of the story was the call, the response and the companionship, the working together with the Lord.

Do you enjoy more being on your own or linking up with others? What is Jesus calling you to do?

Now slowly and prayerfully read the Gospel once again but this time in silence. Consider how this Gospel could apply to your life in general. Thank God for any insight you may have received.

Then ask God to bless you with a spiritual gift to help you act on any resolution you have made. Perhaps: love, understanding, wisdom, faithfulness, peace, self control, patience, joy or something else.



After praying for your loved ones, please remember to pray for the Church and particularly for families connected to your parish school.

You may want to conclude this special weekly time with a simple prayer such as: St Joseph, Patron Saint of Families and Protector of the Church, pray for us. Mary, Star of Evangelisation, pray for us. Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, as it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Fr Henry's reflections on the first and second readings of Sunday 21st January 2024





1st Reading: *Jonah 3:1-5.10*

Nineveh Changes its Ways

The word of the Lord was addressed to Jonah: "Up!" he said. "Go to Nineveh, the great city, and preach to them as I told you to." Jonah set out and went to Nineveh in obedience to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was a city great beyond compare: it took three days to cross it. Jonah went on into the city, making a day's journey. He preached in these words, "Only forty days more and Nineveh is going to be destroyed." And the people of Nineveh believed in God; they proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth, from the greatest to the least. God saw their efforts to renounce their evil behaviour. And God relented: he did not inflict on them the disaster which he had threatened.

The story of Jonah (whale and all) does not even pretend to be historical. For one thing, it takes about ten minutes to walk across the ruins of Nineveh - not three days! The story is a joke by Jews against Jews who think they alone can be saved: Jonah the Jew tries to run away from God, whereas the gentiles at Nineveh repent as soon as they hear God's message - even the animals wear sackcloth! This is like the story about St Peter showing Protestants round heaven: Peter points to a high wall: "Hush! The Catholics are behind there. They think they are the only people here!" This reading is chosen to pair with the call of the disciples because of the immediacy of their response: the Ninevites and the disciples take the message to heart without hesitation.

Have there been any times in your life when, like Jonah, you too have run away from God or judged others harshly?



2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 7:29-31

This Passing World

Brothers: our time is growing short. Those who have wives should live as though they had none, and those who mourn should live as though they had nothing to mourn for; those who are enjoying life should live as though there were nothing to laugh about; those whose life is buying things should live as though they had nothing of their own; and those who have to deal with the world should not become engrossed in it. I say this because the world as we know it is passing away.

The earliest Christians were very aware that the Resurrection of Christ ushered in the last period of the world. With the fulfilment of God's promises in Jesus' death and resurrection everything important had happened. They believed that the end was imminent, and it was urgent for everyone to get ready. What must we think of this attitude two thousand years later? Yes, it is urgent for every individual to respond to God's call, and there is no time to lose. Every decision counts, every step along the path leads in one direction or the other, closer to God or further away. However, this is an instance where we must consider the message of the Bible as a whole, where one teaching balances another. "The Kingdom of God is close at hand!" does not mean that the world will end tomorrow. Matthew's gospel is quite clear that there is time before the last judgment to practise good works of prayer and generosity. At the last supper Jesus teaches that his disciples have a task to do in the world, guided by the Holy Spirit. So Paul is not teaching here that Christians should 'down tools' and sit waiting for the end, but that we must not absorb the values of those around us who think that the supermarket, the sports centre and the holiday cottage are the only realities worth thinking about; for us the Kingdom and its values

What does it mean to say that for Christians "the world as we know it is passing away"?

There is time before the last judgment to practise good works of prayer and generosity.


