Weekly Reflection

This week we hear the story of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead. In this story we see Jesus as a true friend deeply saddened by the death of His good friend and witnessing the grief of his sisters Mary and Martha. We once again see Jesus in this gospel experiencing the emotions and feelings that we do; we see Jesus experiencing the pain of losing someone dear to him. Jesus raises Lazarus up from the dead because he feels deeply sad. The message for us in this Gospel is HOPE, that Jesus walks right beside us in our good times but most importantly in our hard times and that He never leaves our side. Jesus feels our pain as if it is His own. This is a very powerful gospel because the message is that if we bring our sorrows, worries and troubles to Jesus that He will lift us up too.

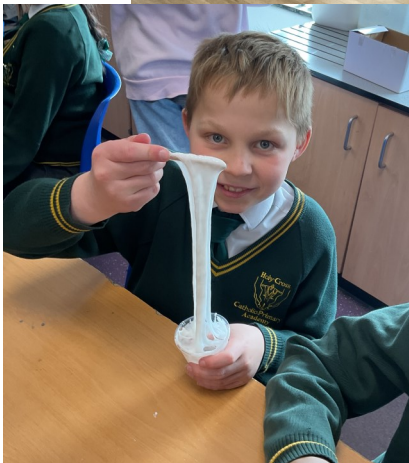

ATTENDANCE MATTERS

Congratulations to this week's winners of the KS1 Attendance Award, Grasshoppers achieving 98% attendance. The winners of this week's KS2 Attendance Award are Hares attaining 99% attendance. Well done!

Please ensure you are sending your child into school everyday, unless they are not well enough to attend. Attending school is so important and makes a huge difference to your child's learning. The gates open at 8:30am until 8.55am.

It is essential you notify us of your child's absence by 9am either by telephone or using the Arbor report absence option on every day of absence. We need full details of why your child is unable to attend school. We are frequently having to contact parents, to find out why their child is absent from school. If you do not notify us of the reason for your child's absence it may not be authorised.

Absences over 3 days require supporting medical evidence, for the additional absence to be authorised. Medical evidence can take the form of prescriptions, antibiotics and medical appointments.

Parents of children below attendance targets will be invited in for a meeting with the Educational Welfare Officer.

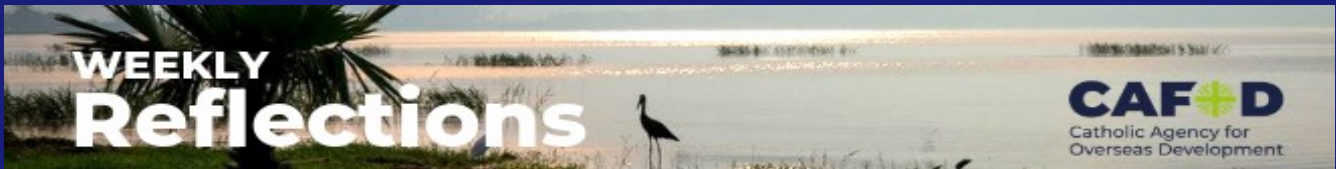

Based on the gospel for Sunday 22 March, Fifth Sunday of Lent: John 11:1-45

Jesus said, "Take away the stone."

"Water is life," says Reason Mupanga simply. Reason works for Caritas Zimbabwe and has seen first-hand the problems that lack of water can bring.

This Sunday's readings focus on the new life that God brings - Ezekiel tells of the dry bones coming to life, Paul reflects on the Spirit dwelling within us, and in the gospel Jesus raises Lazarus from the dead.

Water is indeed life. "Providing water changes a place, its people, and their mindset. It makes everything around it bloom," says Fr Johannes of Caritas Zimbabwe. Thanks to CAFOD supporters like you, many more communities where Reason and Fr Johannes work can now access safe water.

Parched land has truly begun to bloom, as innovative techniques such as drought-resistant crops and solar-powered water pumps are enabling communities to grow food.

This Sunday is World Water Day. As we celebrate the gift of water, we remember communities who face life-threatening water scarcity. God wants all people to have life in abundance. Can we roll away the stones of injustice and ecological destruction and so participate in building a world where all people have safe access to water?

The Fifth Sunday in Lent — John 11:1-45

Relax

Make the Sign of the Cross † and remain still for a minute of settling silence. Then read the Gospel — preferably aloud and slowly — paying attention to any words that stand out to you.



Read

This Sunday's Gospel : THE RAISING OF LAZARUS



The sisters Martha and Mary sent this message to Jesus, 'Lord, the man you love is ill.' On receiving the message, Jesus said, 'This sickness will not end in death but in God's glory, and through it the Son of God will be glorified.' Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, yet when he learned that Lazarus was ill he stayed where he was for two more days before saying to the disciples, 'Let us go to Judaea.' On arriving, Jesus found that Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days already. When Martha heard that Jesus had come she went to meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house. Martha said to Jesus, 'If you had been here, my brother would not have died, but I know that even now, whatever you ask of God, he will grant you.' 'Your brother,' said Jesus to her, 'will rise again.' Martha said, 'I know he will rise again at the resurrection on the last day.' Jesus said, 'I am the resurrection and the life. If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live, and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?' 'Yes Lord,' she said, 'I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to come into this world.' Jesus said in great distress, with a sigh that came straight from the heart, 'Where have you put him?' They said, 'See how much he loved him!' But there were some who remarked, 'He opened the eyes of the blind man; could he not have prevented this man's death?' Still sighing, Jesus reached the tomb; it was a cave with a stone to close the opening. Jesus said, 'Take the stone away.' Martha said to him, 'Lord, by now he will smell; this is the fourth day.' Jesus replied, 'Have I not told you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?' So they took away the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eyes and said, 'Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer. I knew indeed that you always hear me, but I speak for the sake of all these who stand round me, so that they may believe it was you who sent me.' When he had said this, he cried in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, here! Come out!' The dead man came out, his feet and hands bound with bands of stuff and a cloth round his face. Jesus said to them, 'Unbind him, let him go free.' Many of the Jews who had come to visit Mary and had seen what he did believed in him.

Did any words or phrases stand out to you in the Gospel? If so, take a few moments to meditate on them.

Reflect

Now read the Gospel again and consider what the Lord might be saying to you, or asking of you, through it. Then continue by reading Fr Henry Wansbrough's reflection...



This is the third of the great Johannine gospel readings on the Sundays of Lent which lead up to and prepare us for the baptisms of the new members of Christ at the Easter Vigil; today's gospel grips us with the story of Jesus' gift of life to his friend Lazarus. This is not the same thing as the gift of life to us by Jesus in the resurrection, for Lazarus returns to ordinary human life, and will die again, whereas the Christian resurrection transforms us into a new way of life, giving us a life which is a participation in the divine life for ever. Rather, the resurrection of Lazarus is the last and greatest of Jesus' signs, his marvellous works which point towards and hint at this final gift of divine life. The first of the signs was the transformation of the water of the Law into the wine of the messianic wedding banquet at Cana. These signs show who Jesus really is. As well as showing the divine power of Jesus – for only God can give life – they also show the real, human love of Jesus for his friends. He is upset by Lazarus' death and weeps for him, sharing the human sorrow of his family as he shares our sorrows too.

First Reading: *The New Spirit*



Ezekiel 37:12-14

The Lord says this 'I am now going to open your graves; I mean to raise you from your graves, my people, and lead you back to the soil of Israel. And you will know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves and raise you from your graves, my people. And I shall put my spirit in you, and you will live, and I shall resettle you on your own soil; and you will know that I, the Lord, have said and done this' - it is the Lord who speaks.

At the darkest moment of Israel's history, when they are hopeless exiles in Babylon, the prophet Ezekiel foretells a rebirth. In a great vision, of which we read only three paltry verses, he sees a valley full of dead bones. The Lord commands him to breathe on them, and in Hebrew the same word is used

for breath and Spirit. So when Ezekiel breathes on them he breathes the enlivening Spirit of the Lord. The bones come together, are covered with flesh and sinews, and become 'a great, an immense army'. The prophet is foretelling the rebirth of Israel as a nation, prophesying that they will return to life once again in the Promised Land. We can, however, read this prophecy in the light of the biblical revelation as a whole, and see that it is hinting at and mysteriously suggesting a further meaning. In this fullness of meaning the Church has always understood the prophecy as a promise of personal resurrection through the Spirit of God. We are on the threshold of the celebration of the Resurrection of Christ at Easter, and so of our own resurrection in Him. This reading partners today's gospel reading about the new life given to Lazarus.

What is this resurrection to which we look forward?



Second Reading: *The Gift of the Spirit*



Romans 8:8-11

People who are interested only in unspiritual things can never be pleasing to God. Your interests, however, are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him. Though your body may be dead it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.

In the preceding chapters of the Letter to the Romans Paul has described and analysed the process of salvation through Jesus' offering of himself in loving obedience to his Father, and our own integration into Christ by being plunged into him in

baptism, and so joining him in his death and resurrection. This eighth chapter is the chapter of the Spirit, considering how we are transformed by the Spirit of Christ, now become our own spirit, through which we live. The Spirit of the Risen Christ is already in us and is empowering us, but our bodies are not yet transformed, as they will be in the final resurrection. In the later Pauline epistles (Colossians and Ephesians) this is expressed differently: God has already brought you to life with Christ; you have already been raised up; it remains only for this risen life to be revealed with him in glory (Colossians 2:12; 3:4). The Spirit of God and of Christ, described in the Johannine writings as the Paraclete or Helper, leads us into all truth, giving us an ever deeper appreciation of God's gifts to us. The Spirit also gives us strength and zeal to do God's work in all our ways of life.

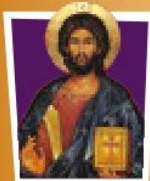

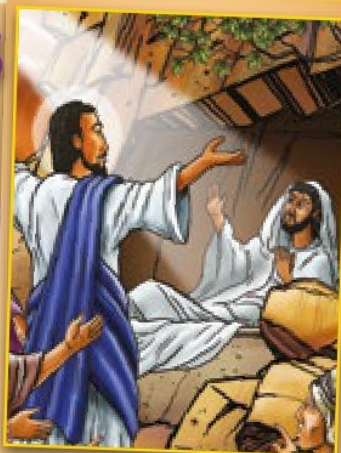

2 SHARE & CARE! Growing in Goodness & Love: This Wednesday's Word...

"Blessed are the compassionate."

St Chromatius (of Aquileia)

Ask your child what the word 'compassion' means to them. Who is the most compassionate person they know, who really listens when they have a problem? Ask them if they can remember a time when someone showed them care and compassion - what did they do? To be compassionate is to share someone's suffering - to feel sorrow for their situation and to do something about it. It may help your child if you can talk about a person whom you know to be compassionate.



Jesus knew that Martha and Mary were sad and he did what he could to help them. People saw this and started to believe in Jesus. Today we can show people how good Jesus is and help others to believe in him by the way we live. Ask your child if they can remember when they last felt sorry for someone and helped them. As a family, ask yourselves, "Is there anyone who needs our compassion and our help at this time? What could we do?"
