John replied, "I am the voice of the one who cries in the wilderness: 'Make the Lord's way straight." Finally they asked him, "Why are you baptising if you are not the Christ, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet?" John said, "I baptise with water. But someone is coming soon who is more powerful than I am." This happened at Bethany, on the far side of the River Jordan, where John was baptising.

#### Abstract

Who did John the Baptist come to tell the people about? This weekend we celebrate the


 third Sunday of Advent which is known as 'Gaudete Sunday', and we light the pink candle on our advent wreath. The word 'Gaudete' in Latin means 'Rejoice!'. We joyfully celebrate that Christmas is near - we rejoice that Christ is coming. Ask your child what the word 'joy' means to them. Each of you say who or what makes you feel joyful. When do you feel joyful? When was the last time you brought joy to others and what did you do? God wants us to be filled with joy - Jesus came to make our joy complete. Happiness comes and goes, but the joy that comes from close friendship with Jesus stays forever."Joy is very infectious; therefore, always be full of joy:" St Teresa of Calcutta Joy is something we all desire. We don't have to search around for joy: it comes from within. When we follow Jesus by loving God and others, we are filled with joy! A joyful heart is a sign of God's Spirit within us. What can you do to help bring joy to others in this coming week? Perhaps you can: give lots of smiles; give someone a gift; remind someone that they are loved by God; cheerfully do what our parents or teachers ask us to do. In these ways we prepare our hearts to be filled with a joy that lasts long after the Christmas festivities have passed.

## Preparing for the Mass of Sunday $20^{\text {th }}$ December 2020 - The Fourth Sunday in Advent

## 1 Relax \& Remember

Set aside 10-15 minutes and create a suitable environment by removing any distractions. Make sure that you are comfortable. Perhaps light a candle. Make the sign of the cross $\dagger$ and remain still for a minute of settling silence. Call to mind the love that God has for you. Remember that through this scripture our Lord is truly present. Then read the Gospel, preferably aloud and slowly, and pay attention to any words that stand out. If any do, meditate on them for a few minutes and be invited into a dialogue with God.


## 2. Read

Taken from the Gospel for Sunday 20 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ December 2020 (Luke 1: 26-38): The Annunciation
The angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the House of David; and the virgin's name was Mary. He went in and said to her, 'Rejoice, so highly favoured! The Lord is with you.' She was deeply disturbed by these words and asked herself what this greeting could mean, but the angel said to her, 'Mary, do not be afraid; you have won God's favour. Listen! You are to conceive and bear a son, and you must name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his ancestor David; he will rule over the House of Jacob for ever and his reign will have no end.' Mary said to the angel, 'But how can this come about, since I am a virgin?' 'The Holy Spirit will come upon you,' the angel answered, 'and the power of the Most High will cover you with its shadow. And so the child will be holy and will be called Son of God. Know this too: your cousin Elizabeth has, in her old age, herself conceived a son, and she whom people called barren is now in her sixth month, for nothing is impossible to God.' 'I am the handmaid of the Lord,' said Mary, 'let what you have said be done to me.' And the angel left her.

3- Reflect
After spending a few minutes considering this Gospel, continue by reading Fr Henry Wansbrough's reflection.
As we prepare for the birth of Jesus, the final Sunday of Advent always focuses on Mary. What was the young girl Mary doing when the message came? Kneeling in prayer? Feeding the sheep? Fetching water? Sweeping the mud floor? What was she thinking? Engaged to be married, surely about her approaching wedding to Joseph and about the children she would mother. Then came the message which she could accept or refuse, the message on which hung the future of the world: her child would be different from all others. How 'different'? Her thoughts were turned back to the promise to David. It had been read to her so often in the Bible, and now the words echoed in her mind as she listened to the angel say, 'His reign will have no end'. This would all be the work of the Spirit which she had so often heard about in Isaiah: 'the Holy Spirit will come upon you', the Spirit which was to come upon the Servant of the Lord, the Spirit of Emmanuel, 'God with us'. Her young body was to grow, nourish and develop this child. Then she would have the child in her arms to cherish and shape as both Son of God and her own son.
What sort of person was Mary? Would you have liked to get to know her? What is God's plan for you?

Fr Henry's reflections on the first and second readings of Sunday 20 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ December 2020

## First Reading: A King for Ever

## 2 Samuel 7:1-5. 8-12. 14. 16

Once David had settled into his house and the Lord had given him rest from all the enemies surrounding him, the king said to the prophet Nathan, 'Look, I am living in a house of cedar while the ark of God dwells in a tent.' Nathan said to the king, 'Go and do all that is in your mind, for the Lord is with you.' But that very night the word of the Lord came to Nathan: 'Go and tell my servant David, "Thus the Lord speaks: Are you the man to build me a house to dwell in? I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep, to be leader of my people Israel; I have been with you on all your expeditions; I have cut off all your enemies before you. I will give you fame as great as the fame of the greatest on earth. I will provide a place for my people Israel; I will plant them there and they shall dwell in that place and never be disturbed again; nor shall the wicked continue to oppress them as they did, in the days when I appointed judges over my people Israel; I will give them rest from all their enemies. The Lord will make you great; the Lord will make you a House. And when your days are ended and you are laid to rest with your ancestors, I will preserve the offspring of your body after you and make his sovereignty secure. I will be a father to him and he a son to me. Your House and your sovereignty will always stand secure before me and your throne be established forever."

At the height of his powers King David wants to thank God for his lavish favours by building him a house. No human being patronises God, and David was not allowed to build the Temple. But God replies with the promise that he will build David a House. In one sense David's House crashed into ruins when the last king of Judah was blinded and taken off into exile in Babylon. But the promise of an eternal kingship still stands. It is fulfilled in the eternal kingship of the Son of David who is also Mary's Son, and this fulfilment begins at the Annunciation. This is why so many phrases from the prophet Nathan's promise are echoed in the annunciation of the angel to Mary. 'Your sovereignty will always stand secure before me and your throne be established for ever', says Nathan. 'He will rule over the House of Jacob for ever and his reign will have no end', says the angel.
What is the "House" that God promises to build for David?

## Second Reading: The Last Secret

## Romans 16:25-27

Glory to him who is able to give you the strength to live according to the Good News I preach, and in which I proclaim Jesus Christ, the revelation of a mystery kept secret for endless ages, but now so clear that it must be broadcast to pagans everywhere to bring them to the obedience of faith. This is only what scripture has predicted, and it is all part of the way the eternal God wants things to be. He alone is wisdom; give glory therefore to him through Jesus Christ forever and ever. Amen.
> ${ }^{6} f$ Our celebration of Christmas is not just of a baby born at Bethlehem. It is of the climax of God's plan for the world.

This reading gives the final cry of excitement and triumph at the end of Paul's great letter to the Christians of Rome. His task is to reveal to the nations (not just to the Jews) God's secret plan, which has been brewing all through human history and now comes to its climax in Christ. God has offered his friendship and his divine wisdom in Christ. Human beings respond with the obedience of 'faith', a keyword of the letter: we need only trust God's promises for all our weakness to be buried under God's glory. Ultimately, all we need do in this 'obedience of faith' is simply hang on by our finger-tips, accepting God's promised help. Our celebration of Christmas is not just of a baby born at Bethlehem. It is of the climax of God's plan for the world, the keystone of history. So we do not merely look back on it as a great event. Christians must see it as the anchor of God's design for the whole of history and for the course of each day.
What is God's plan for the world? What is his plan for me - in my life and on this day?

## Based on the gospel for Sunday 13 December - John 1:6-8, 19-28

"He came as a witness, to bear witness to the light, so that everyone might believe through him."

John the Baptist came as a witness to the light, to prepare the people for the coming of Christ. He baptised them with water, but he also let them know that someone else was coming who was far greater than him.

Because he bore witness to his faith through his actions, many people came to believe.
Particularly in times of uncertainty, we need those, like John the Baptist, who lead the way. Those who shine their lights for us to follow, filling us with confidence, and helping us to believe that better times are coming.

At the beginning of the coronavirus pandemic, Mustapha, a lab technician at the Handmaid's Catholic Health Clinic in Sierra Leone, didn't feel safe working. He didn't have adequate PPE. Patients stopped visiting the clinic because they didn't feel safe receiving treatment either. However, things are changing for the better. Since receiving PPE from local experts supported by CAFOD, staff like Mustapha feel far more confident in their work. Encouraged by this, patients have also started to return.

In these uncertain times this Advent, let us all look out for those who can inspire us with their faith, their witness and their actions. And let us think about how we can bear witness to the light in our own lives and to those around us.
